Indiana APS Program Transition Key Information: What Stakeholders Need to Know *Transition is effective July 1, 2025*

What's Changing?

- APS is no longer operated by county prosecutors
- PCG-IN (Public Consulting Group-Indiana) is the new statewide provider, selected through competitive procurement
- APS investigations will be managed by five regional teams, coordinated under a statewide model
- All investigators use standardized tools for consistency and timelines
- There will be a new state-wide email address dedicated to incident reports:

What's Not Changing

- Mandated Reporting: All Hoosiers are still required to report suspected adult maltreatment
- Report Content: Must include client demographics, maltreatment details, and (optionally) reporter information
- Client Rights: Adults retain the right to decline APS services unless court-ordered

Intake & Investigation

- All reports are screened using a statewide risk tool
- Cases prioritized according to risk
- Investigators conduct face-to-face visits, risk assessments, and coordinate voluntary services

Transition Commitments

- Ensure uninterrupted access to APS reporting and investigations
- Minimize disruption to open and ongoing APS cases
