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JOINT INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SOUTH SHORE CONVENTION & VISITORS AUTHORITY AND LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA FOR THE GARY AIR SHOW LOCATED IN LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA

THIS JOINT INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SOUTH SHORE CONVENTION & VISITORS AUTHORITY AND LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA FOR THE GARY AIR SHOW (hereinafter referred to as this "Agreement") is made and entered into in accordance with Indiana Code §36-1-7, et seq., as amended from time to time, by and between the SOUTH SHORE CONVENTION & VISITORS AUTHORITY, in Lake County, Indiana, a Convention and Visitors Bureau created under Indiana statute, by its BOARD as its executive and fiscal body (hereinafter referred to as "SSCVA "), and LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA, a unit of local government, by its BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS as its executive and its COUNTY COUNCIL as its fiscal body (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, SSCVA is a Convention and Visitors Bureau created under Code § 6-9-2-3, located in Lake County, Indiana; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY is a unit of local government located in Lake County, Indiana, with jurisdiction over certain real property located within the corporate boundaries of Lake County; and

WHEREAS, SSCVA and COUNTY have each been advised that the provisions of Indiana Code §36-1-7-1, *et seq.* (Interlocal Cooperation Act and referred to hereinafter as the "Act"), as amended from time to time, permit local governmental units and entities to make the most efficient use of their powers by enabling governmental units to mutually contract and utilize services for the mutual benefit of the participating governmental entities; and

WHEREAS, SSCVA and COUNTY are political subdivisions created by Indiana statute, empowered by the Act with authority to contract on behalf of each other on a basis of mutual advantage so as to better provide public services and facilities at a lesser cost; and

WHEREAS, SSCVA and COUNTY each seek to enter into a joint interlocal cooperation agreement based upon the terms and provisions of the Act, as amended from time to time, together, for costs which will be incurred by SSCVA for the Gary Air Show (hereinafter referred to as "Air Show"); and

WHEREAS, SSCVA, and COUNTY have determined that entry into a joint interlocal cooperation agreement for the AIR SHOW is in the best interests of SSCVA and COUNTY, and therefore, have determined that it is advisable to enter into and become a participating unit under such a joint interlocal cooperation agreement pursuant to the applicable provisions of State Law, as amended from time to time.

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COVENANTS

NOW, THEREFORE, SSCVA and COUNTY, in consideration of the terms and conditions set forth herein, all of which are hereby acknowledged, do hereby agree as follows:

SECTION 1: DURATION.

The duration of this Agreement shall be from its effective date to completion and acceptance of the Project as defined herein.

SECTION 2: PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth and establish the responsibilities and obligations of SSCVA and COUNTY concerning the AIR SHOW.

SECTION 3: EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of this act shall be after the agreement has been signed by a majority of the elected officials of each party necessary to constitute an official act and a copy of the executed agreement is placed on record and filed with the Lake County Recorder.

SECTION 4: PROJECT DEFINED.

This Project is funding for the Gary Air Show.

SECTION 5: PROJECT FUNDING.

COUNTY agrees to pay to SSCVA within thirty (30) days of SSCVA commencing the Project, the amount of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS and NO CENTS (\$25,000.00) to help fund the Project. This contribution of COUNTY is solely for costs SSCVA will incur for the AIR SHOW.

SECTION 6: ADMINISTRATION AND AUTHORITY DELEGATION.

- A. This Agreement shall be administered as follows:
 - 1) SSCVA shall use the funds for costs which will be incurred by SSCVA for the AIR SHOW.
 - 2) With the \$25,000.00 received from LAKE COUNTY, SSCVA shall use the funds for the AIR SHOW.
- B. The SECRETARY OF SSCVA, is hereby designated to receive, disburse, and account for all funds pursuant to this Agreement.

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- C. SSCVA shall use the funds in accordance with all state and local rules and laws.
- D. Because the COUNTY will have no supervisory responsibility for the purchases made by SSCVA, the COUNTY will not be in privity of contract with any person or company contacted by SSCVA to complete the project, and COUNTY'S only involvement during the project is to provide funding, the County of Lake and any and all of its elected officials, appointed officials, offices, departments, divisions, employees, to include those of the Lake County Highway Department shall not be liable for and SSCVA shall hold the aforementioned unit, bodies, and persons harmless from any loss or damage to any party that may occur during the AIR SHOW.
- E. The project will be deemed completed when SSCVA certifies to COUNTY the funds were used for the AIR SHOW as outlined in this Agreement.

SECTION 7: ASSIGNMENT OF RIGHTS.

No Party shall assign, delegate, or otherwise transfer its rights and obligations as set forth in this Agreement to any other entity.

SECTION 8: AMENDMENTS.

The terms of this Agreement may not be amended, supplemented, waived or modified without the prior written approval of all Parties.

SECTION 9: FORCE MAJEURE.

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, SSCVA and COUNTY, shall not be deemed in default or in breach of this Agreement to the extent it is unable to perform due to an event of Force Majeure. For the purpose of this Agreement, Force Majeure shall mean and include any act of God, accident, fire, lockout, strike or other labor dispute, riot or civil commotion, act of public enemy, failure of transportation facilities, enactment, rule, order, or act of government or governmental instrumentality (whether domestic or international and whether federal, state or local, or the international equivalent thereof), failure of technical difficulties, or any other cause of any nature whatsoever beyond the control of SSCVA and COUNTY, which was not avoidable in the exercise of reasonable care and foresight.

SECTION 10: NOTICES.

All notices required to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing, and deemed sufficient to each Party when sent by United States Mail, postage prepaid, or hand-delivered, to the following:

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SECTION 11: CAPTIONS.

The captions and section designations herein set forth are for convenience only, and shall have no substantive meaning.

SECTION 12: SEVERABILITY.

In the event that any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or provision hereof is held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect the remaining portions of this Agreement, and the same shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 13: ENTIRETY OF AGREEMENT.

This Agreement represents the entire understanding between the Parties and supersedes all other negotiations, representations, or agreements, whether written or verbal, relating to this Agreement. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of, and shall be binding upon the Parties, and their respective assigns and successors in interest.

SECTION 14: MATERIAL DISPUTE.

The parties agree that SSCVA and COUNTY shall meet for resolution purposes. Thereafter, if the dispute is unable to be resolved, the Parties agree that the dispute will be governed by the laws of the State of Indiana in a court of competent jurisdiction. The Parties agree that each Party shall be responsible for its own attorney fees, absent any applicable provision of law to the contrary.

SECTION 15: COUNTERPARTS.

This Agreement shall be signed in counterparts and each of said counterparts shall be considered an original.

SECTION 16: RECORDING AND FILING.

- A. Before this Agreement takes effect, it must be recorded with the Office of the Lake County Recorder.
- B. No later than sixty (60) days after it takes effect and is recorded, the Agreement must be filed with the Office of the State Board of Accounts for audit purposes all pursuant to I.C. §36-1-7-6.

SECTION 17: PUBLIC ACTION AND RATIFICATION.

A. Because there exists a situation where time is of the essence, the parties will have their respective elected officials sign the agreement to make it effective and then ratify it at a subsequent public meeting.

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- B. To be effective with a retroactive ratification, the following must occur at a public meeting:
 - 1) The South Shore Convention & Visitors Authority Board as the executive and fiscal body of SSCVA, Lake County, Indiana, a Municipal Corporation.
 - 2) The Lake County Council has the fiscal body of the County of Lake, Indiana.
 - 3) The Board of Commissioners as the county executive of the County of Lake, Indiana.

THIS JOINT INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE RIVER FOREST COMMUNITY SCHOOL CORPORATION AND LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA FOR EQUIPMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FOR RIVER FOREST HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC'S (hereinafter referred to as this "Agreement") is made and entered into in accordance with Indiana Code §36-1-7, et seq., as amended from time to time, by and between the RIVER FOREST COMMUNITY SCHOOL CORPORATION, Lake County, Indiana, an Indiana School, by its board (hereinafter referred to as "RFCSC"), and LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA, a unit of local government, by its BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS as its executive and its COUNTY COUNCIL as its fiscal body (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, RFCSC is a school corporation in Lake County, Indiana; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY is a unit of local government located in Lake County, Indiana, with jurisdiction over certain real property located within the corporate boundaries of Lake County; and

WHEREAS, RFCSC and COUNTY have each been advised that the provisions of Indiana Code §36-1-7-1, *et seq.* (Interlocal Cooperation Act and referred to hereinafter as the "Act"), as amended from time to time, permit local governmental units and entities to make the most efficient use of their powers by enabling governmental units to mutually contract and utilize services for the mutual benefit of the participating governmental entities; and

WHEREAS, RFCSC and COUNTY are empowered by the Act with authority to contract on behalf of each other on a basis of mutual advantage so as to better provide public services and facilities at a lesser cost; and

WHEREAS, RFCSC and COUNTY each seek to enter into a joint interlocal cooperation agreement based upon the terms and provisions of the Act, as amended from time to time, together, for equipment and improvement costs which will be incurred by RFCSC for River Forest High School Athletics, hereafter referred to as EQUIPMENT (See Attached Exhibit "A"); and

WHEREAS, RFCSC, and COUNTY have determined that entry into a joint interlocal cooperation agreement for the EQUIPMENT is in the best interests of the residents and students of RFCSC and COUNTY, and therefore, have determined that it is advisable to enter into and become a participating unit under such a joint interlocal cooperation agreement pursuant to the applicable provisions of State Law, as amended from time to time.

COVENANTS

NOW, THEREFORE, RFCSC and COUNTY, in consideration of the terms and conditions set forth herein, all of which are hereby acknowledged, do hereby agree as follows:

SECTION 1: DURATION.

The duration of this Agreement shall be from its effective date to completion and delivery of the Equipment as defined herein.

SECTION 2: PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth and establish the responsibilities and obligations of RFCSC and COUNTY concerning the EQUIPMENT.

SECTION 3: EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of this act shall be after the agreement has been signed by a majority of the elected officials of each party necessary to constitute an official act and a copy of the executed agreement is placed on record and filed with the Lake County Recorder.

SECTION 4: EQUIPMENT DEFINED.

This EQUIPMENT is for River Forest High School Athletics which will improve public health and will benefit the students and citizens of Lake County, Indiana.

SECTION 5: EQUIPMENT FUNDING.

COUNTY agrees to pay to RFCSC within thirty (30) days of RFCSC commencing the equipment purchase(s), the amount of FORTY THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED THIRTY-EIGHT DOLLARS and NO CENTS (\$40,938.00) to help fund the Equipment. This contribution of COUNTY is solely for costs RFCSC will incur for the EQUIPMENT.

SECTION 6: ADMINISTRATION AND AUTHORITY DELEGATION.

- A. This Agreement shall be administered as follows:
 - 1) RFCSC shall use the funds for equipment costs which will be incurred by RFCSC for River Forest High School Athletics.
 - 2) With the \$40,938.00 received from LAKE COUNTY, RFCSC shall use the funds for River Forest High School Athletics.
- B. The SECRETARY OF RFCSC, is hereby designated to receive, disburse, and account for all funds pursuant to this Agreement.

C. RFCSC shall use the funds in accordance with all state and local rules and laws.

- D. Because the COUNTY will have no supervisory responsibility for the purchases made by RFCSC, the COUNTY will not be in privity of contract with any person or company contacted by RFCSC to provide the equipment, and COUNTY'S only involvement is to provide funding, the County of Lake and any and all of its elected officials, appointed officials, offices, departments, divisions, employees, to include those of the Lake County Highway Department shall not be liable for and RFCSC shall hold the aforementioned unit, bodies, and persons harmless from any loss or damage to any party that may occur during these purchases.
- E. The purchases will be deemed completed when RFCSC certifies to COUNTY the purchases have been made and the products delivered and provides COUNTY with a detailed list of how the funds were used for the purchased equipment.

SECTION 7: ASSIGNMENT OF RIGHTS.

No Party shall assign, delegate, or otherwise transfer its rights and obligations as set forth in this Agreement to any other entity.

SECTION 8: AMENDMENTS.

The terms of this Agreement may not be amended, supplemented, waived or modified without the prior written approval of all Parties.

SECTION 9: FORCE MAJEURE.

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, RFCSC and COUNTY, shall not be deemed in default or in breach of this Agreement to the extent it is unable to perform due to an event of Force Majeure. For the purpose of this Agreement, Force Majeure shall mean and include any act of God, accident, fire, lockout, strike or other labor dispute, riot or civil commotion, act of public enemy, failure of transportation facilities, enactment, rule, order, or act of government or governmental instrumentality (whether domestic or international and whether federal, state or local, or the international equivalent thereof), failure of technical difficulties, or any other cause of any nature whatsoever beyond the control of RFCSC and COUNTY, which was not avoidable in the exercise of reasonable care and foresight.

SECTION 10: NOTICES.

All notices required to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing, and deemed sufficient to each Party when sent by United States Mail, postage prepaid, or hand-delivered, to the following:

SECTION 11: CAPTIONS.

The captions and section designations herein set forth are for convenience only, and shall have no substantive meaning.

SECTION 12: SEVERABILITY.

In the event that any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or provision hereof is held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect the remaining portions of this Agreement, and the same shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 13: ENTIRETY OF AGREEMENT.

This Agreement represents the entire understanding between the Parties and supersedes all other negotiations, representations, or agreements, whether written or verbal, relating to this Agreement. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of, and shall be binding upon the Parties, and their respective assigns and successors in interest.

SECTION 14: MATERIAL DISPUTE.

The parties agree that RFCSC and COUNTY shall meet for resolution purposes. Thereafter, if the dispute is unable to be resolved, the Parties agree that the dispute will be governed by the laws of the State of Indiana in a court of competent jurisdiction. The Parties agree that each Party shall be responsible for its own attorney fees, absent any applicable provision of law to the contrary.

SECTION 15: COUNTERPARTS.

This Agreement shall be signed in counterparts and each of said counterparts shall be considered an original.

SECTION 16: RECORDING AND FILING.

- A. Before this Agreement takes effect, it must be recorded with the Office of the Lake County Recorder.
- B. No later than sixty (60) days after it takes effect and is recorded, the Agreement must be filed with the Office of the State Board of Accounts for audit purposes all pursuant to I.C. §36-1-7-6.

SECTION 17: PUBLIC ACTION AND RATIFICATION.

- A. Because there exists a situation where time is of the essence, the parties will have their respective elected officials sign the agreement to make it effective and then ratify it at a subsequent public meeting.
- B. To be effective with a retroactive ratification, the following must occur at a public meeting:
 - 1) RFCSC School Board as the executive and fiscal body of RFCSC, an Indiana School Corporation.
 - -2) The Lake County Council has the fiscal body-of the County of Lake, Indiana.
 - 3) The Board of Commissioners as the county executive of the County of Lake, Indiana.

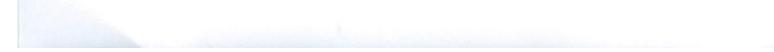

In the <u>Matter of Presentations – Good for Youth Farm Update</u>, presented by Robert Colangelo, Founder and CEA of Technology, Inc.

Robert Colangelo – Thank you for the opportunity to present an update on this exciting project that really feels a need in the community. Also, thank you to Ted Bilski for his support and Judge Stefaniak for leadership on this project. In your packets, you have two different presentations-one is just a short sixpager that I'll present today, and the others are detailed strategic plans for improving and expanding farm operations that were finished in March of 2024. I want you to walk away with three points: that there's a real need in the community as inflation continues and the price for food increases. There's a lot of working people that can't afford food, and so we've identified the real way that we can help the community; second, we won a federal competitive grant to help offset some of the cost to build and improve the farm complex: and third, we built some really strong partnerships. Our visions really remain the same and that's to create a center that's focused on agricultural innovation that fosters collaboration between the government community organizations in the private sector with the real goal to improve the health wellness and the quality of life for all citizens in Lake County and our goals are to increase current farm production capacity and get all our produce to the food bank of Northwest Indiana; provide job training and continuing education so that not only is that focused on growing food, but it's also on creating jobs for all ages and then lastly build partnerships with academic institutions community and civic group businesses to improve that health and well-being. So, our accomplishments are that we've finished the initial design for the greenhouses in the indoor farm, and we're working on getting bids back hopefully out this month for the concrete pads. We did move the raised beds further north and moved the greenhouses down further south; this allowed us to be more efficient and lower our cost removing the utilities to the farming operation. We won a competitive grant with the USDA for \$323,000, which is a pretty significant amount to cover a portion of the installation and operating cost for the farms. That grant is also going to fund two sustainability initiatives, one a solar panel and a solar system to provide renewable energy, and the second to recycle our nutrient water and up-use the use instead of wasting it; we could use it to irrigate the landscapes in the area. Also, we've identified a number of other grants that we can apply to this project, so this is really a haven for federal and state funds. The biggest one is that we have secured an agreement with the Food Bank of Northwest Indiana. We visited them and they're very happy to be a partner of ours. They showed us that they do seven million pounds of food each year, but their biggest issue is getting fresh produce, so they're very happy that we're able to help them and provide that on a continual basis. And then we also built partnerships with the Purdue Extension Service to help us develop some of our educational, training, and tour programs. We've built partnerships with Purdue University, Dr. Petrus Langenhoven, to provide technical support to make sure farm operations are moving smoothly and working closely with the health department. As mentioned in detail in the strategic plan, our goal is to grow four crops: lettuce, basil, tomatoes, and cucumbers, all of which the food bank can use. Our proposed schedule is to get those bid specs out as soon as possible and to get the indoor farms constructed by January, the greenhouses by March/April and around January once we start to get some of the farm operations up and running, we want to engage and find a grower manager that really will take over the project, and then we hope to get the first crop to the food bank by September 2025. So again, I thank the Council, Councilman Bilski, and Judge Stefaniak for their leadership. We think this is a great opportunity to create a nationwide model that can show how government and the private sector of the community can work together to create health and wellness in the community, and it's really a way to have some compassion for those in need.

Councilman Lindemulder – How much are we talking out-of-pocket for the county?

Bilski – That depends on the grants. But you're looking at less than \$200,000 a year.

Lindemulder – Looking at this from a business proposal, you spoke quite a bit about providing needed fresh produce for the community, but if we're saying were providing this produce, for the amount of money were putting in couldn't we just buy produce and give it to the food bank? I'm ok with this project, as long as it's something that's going to teach kids life skills but I think from a business standpoint, I would say that we could much cheaper buy a bunch of lettuce and give it to the food bank.

Bilski – We have a hard time getting that produce to those food banks and that affordability. There's a huge need for that. If it was as simple as asking Baker Produce to buy 10,000 heads of lettuce, it's not there up North. They are having a hard time getting that food on the shelves at the food pantries so this fills that gap at no cost. This is going to be if anything a property tax-based fund. The taxpayers are going to receive something for their property taxes they paid. Anyone eligible, which is everyone, would come and get their free produce with no charge. Strack and Van Til has already said that if we get kids that are qualified, they will place those kids into employment. So, there's job creation in that and rehabilitation for some of the kids that qualify. You can't purchase it for what you could grow it for.

Robert Colangelo – I agree it serves two purposes, but if you amortize your capital expense over 10 years, it's like 30,000 a year and so I would agree that we could be very competitively priced in growing the crops especially when you offset up with the USDA grant so I think that will be competitively priced, and you will also be able to help the job training and continuing education.



In the Matter of Presentations - Health Department Presentation on Health First Indiana

Michelle Arnold, Health First Indiana manager presented the following:



Council comments:

Niemeyer – The stabbing of the young teenage girl in Lowell by a suspect tied to the MS13 gang is a wakeup call for all of us. My prayers are with her and her family as well as hope for her full recovery. We must come together and support them in this difficult time. I Also want to extend my deepest gratitude to Lake County Sheriff's department and all law enforcement agencies involved in apprehending the suspect before more harm could be done and they really did an incredible job at tracking this guy and apprehending him. I was very pleased to see the cooperation. Their work to keep our community safe as nothing short of heroic. This tragedy highlights a broader issue. We cannot continue to allow dangerous criminals like this in our communities. The safety of our families and neighborhoods must be our top priority. What happened in Lowell is not an isolated incident it's part of a larger pattern of violence that straining or law-enforcement resources and placing an immense financial burden on taxpayers. It's time we take real action, protect our communities and secure our country. So this statement is one that I get a lot of outreach from constituents in the seventh district that feel like they feel the pressure on every community is ramping up all over the district, all over my district and all over the county so I wanted to just make sure that that statement was set on the record and give my condolences and prayers to the family, but also the appreciation to the law-enforcement agencies that came together to make sure that this dangerous criminal was apprehended.

Public Comments:

Barbara Koteles of Hobart – What I want to talk about is that the health board is going to be getting another infusion of money. I heard it was 6 million, but maybe it's 4 1/2, but I just want to remind you that you're releasing taxpayer funds to an organization that has tried to shut the taxpayer out in so many ways for a long time. I tried to email them, and then it goes to do not reply, and they've known about it. I don't know if it's fixed yet, but it was going on for a long time. In a couple ways, they violated the Indiana open door law, and you know about this because we stated it before. They will not release minutes from their meetings from 2020 until 2024. Recently they did list some meeting dates on their website, but then they removed them, and then we found out they had another meeting on 48-hour notice that was the August meeting. Then they put the dates up again, and they put minutes for the June and August meetings, but then they took them down after a couple of days, but I screenshotted them, and these minutes didn't say what board members were present. It didn't list a rollcall vote for any of the motions, and that's in violation of the Indiana open door law as well. So, then I'll just end by going back to three questions that I think are kind of important: The director, or shall we say the administrator of the health board, is that a full-time or part-time job? That's something we've been wanting to know. I mean, it's a benign question, I think, and the public health officer, is that a full-time or part-time position? I would really like to know that information. How did the taxpayer pay back another 25% of that original 4 1/2 or five million? How did that get paid back? Then finally, the health board is appointed. There're no elections there. the directors not elected, the public health officers not elected. Who has oversight of the health board? O'Donnell – The health board is in charge of the decisions but everyone in the health department is a commissioner's employee.
